ABOUT US

Solid State is building a solidarity economy, grounded in Surrey, BC, made by racialized communities: a mutually supportive network, a cooperative of cooperatives, bound together by a commitment to friendship and mutual aid.

Our primary route is through worker cooperatives with people from racialized migrant backgrounds. We believe that the co-op model is highly capacious: it brings people together to work on a common project, build real-world skills, develop new mobilities and earn real income.

More than that, we believe that by working cooperatively together over an extended period of time, our cohorts develop a familial sense of long-term attachments and commitments and a different set of relational possibilities.





OUR STORY

Solid State was founded in 2015 and launched in 2017 specifically to work and organize against the alarming tides of racial violence, xenophobia and white nationalisms that were increasingly evident in Surrey (like so much of the world). Solid State is trying to chart new narratives and different kinds of stories, trying to address the endemic lack of mobility, access to resources, training and education, and the entwined marginalization/isolation so many racialized youth in sub-urban areas feel consigned/resigned to.

WHAT We do






We build co-ops, but it's a lot more than that... Solid State mainly builds worker cooperatives, but not exclusively. We are building a solidarity economy in Surrey, so our projects and enterprises take all kinds of shapes and forms – bound together by a commitment to cooperativism and working past extractivism and exploitation.

The 'Industries' in our name is critical. We are trying to build stuff together. We are not a charitable organization. Solid State is built by and for racialized communities who are creating new economic relationships together. Intercultural learning, solidarity and community is at the heart of the SSCI way of working, playing and being together in the world.

SOLIDARITY

Solid State is a hub for new solidarity economy projects and enterprises: we offer training and mentorship, working space, co-op and business development support, skills-training, funding, organizational and technical support, and anything else we can conjure to support our enterprises.

Most importantly, we offer friendship and solidarity. We have an awesome inhouse cook, and all of our cohorts eat together every time they meet. Eating together is at the centre of what we do, and all our best work happens around the table together.



MESSAGE From Co-Directors

As we continue to add co-ops, participants and staff (we have 17 co-ops, 150+ participants and 20 staff) we continue to add to the co-director team that works together to shepherd all aspects of Solid State.

The larger staff make all major decisions collaboratively and it is the co-directors who guide the project on a day-to-day basis. We are extremely lucky to have a leadership team that is so capable and committed, but also works together so easily. Our 2022 co-directors are:

OUR GROWTH

Solid State continued to grow quickly, but this year we really focused on deepening and strengthening our work. We were able to raise all our staff's wages (everyone at Solid State is paid the same hourly wage), we assembled a four-person development team to really push each co-op to ambitious horizons, develop durable business and revenue models, get each cohort incorporated, and create formalized cooperative decision-making structures. We now have three separate physical locations, twenty staff. and between Solid State itself and each of our seventeen cohorts. we put on hundreds of events, workshops, trainings, classes, parties, and celebrations of all kinds and sizes.

We are doing everything we can think of to support all of our cohorts to create viable enterprises, real jobs and horizons that all members are proud of. Our 2022 cohorts are:

The Black Arts Centre is a gallery, performance and community space that centres young Black artists and events.






Undermining the basis of anti-Black racism in BC schools through workshops, training, curriculum support, events and Black Student Unions.




A sustainable clothing and fashion brand making high-quality, accessible clothing.

WHAT'S Coming IN 2023





Emboldened by the success of our existing co-ops and some significant new support from a wide variety of supporters and community partners, Solid State continues to grow and expand. We are committed to deepening our work with our existing network of co-ops and participants, and to really push each co-op forward.

As 2022 ends, we are deep in the process of adding more cohorts, new staff + new infrastructure, and in January 2023 we will be launching the first of a wave of new enterprises. The big horizon for us is to create a co-op of co-ops, something akin to Mondragon, Co-op Cincy, the Evergreen Co-ops in Cleveland, or Cooperation Jackson. We have a good way to go to really articulate this vision – but we're getting there!
